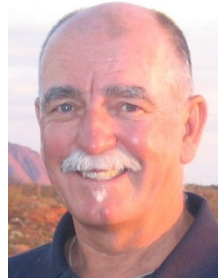


**RICHARD (DICK) OLESINSKI**
